# コーンズ商会 (Cornes & Co.) 関係文書について (その二) ——W. G. Aspinall の周辺資料——

## 1

コーンズ商会は、ウィリアム・グレグスン・アスピノール (William Gregson Aspinall) とフレデリック・コーンズ (Frederick Cornes) の両名によって創始された。以下では、アスピノールについて、若干の資料を提供しておきたい。

アスピノールの出自や経歴については、まだ何程のことも知られていない。1822年にリヴァプールで生まれており、したがってフレデリック・コーンズ (1837年生まれ) よりほぼ15歳年長だったことになる。

1850年8月3日に NORTH CHINA HERALD の創刊第一号が刊行されたが、この紙面に、LIST OF FOREIGN RESIDENTS IN SHANGHAI というリストが掲載されており、その中に、William Gregson Aspinall, MERCANTILE ASSISTANT, MACKENZIE BROTHERS & CO. と記載されている。このリストにはまだ、フレデリック・コーンズの名前は見られない。コーンズの方は、やや遅く、1857年に上海に行ったようである。

この NORTH CHINA HERALD に1860年4月14日付けで、アスピノールは、神奈川で1860年5月1日から、Tea Inspector and General Commission Agent を開業する旨を広告している。(次頁を参照) アスピノール・コーンズ商会の創業は、1861年4月1日であるが、これをみる

と、アスピノールは、その1年ほど前の、1860年5月1日、すでに神奈川に進出して単独で事業を始めており、のちこれにフレデリック・コーンズが加わって Aspinall, Cornes & Co. として1861年4月1日に出発したと考えてよいようである。

おそらくはこうした経緯で、アスピノールは、フレデリック・コーンズとイクオール・パートナーのかたちで Aspinall, Cornes & Co. を創立し、成功を収めた。

いわゆる生麦事件(1862年)の記事に、殺害されたりチャードソンの検死が、アスピノールの家で行われた旨が記されている。すなわち「9月15日月曜日、アスピノール氏の自宅で、チャールズ・レノックス・リチャードソン (Charles Lenox Richardson) の死体の検死が行われた。」(NORTH-CHINA HERALD, Oct. 11, 1862) これより先、1861年、神奈川に居住するイギリス人と、在神奈川イギリス代理領事との間で、国際法に関する論争がなされたことがある。その際の論争点は2点あり、1) 条約上の特権めぐりのもので、領事は居住者が日本人の感情を踏み躪りたいと考えているとし、居住者は日本の法律の下に置かれることをいさぎよしとしていない、という問題、2) リボルバー拳銃の携行を禁止しようとする

る領事の意見と、これに反対する居住者側の意見、というのがその内容である。この在神奈川イギリス代理領事 (Captain F. Howard Vyse, H. B. M.'s Acting Consul, Kanagawa) との往復書簡の宛名の中に、W. G. Aspinall の名が見える。(NORTH-CHINA HERALD, Jan. 19, 1861)

また、当時におけるアスピノールの社会的地位を示す貴重な資料が英国外務省文書に残されている。

1869年8月29日の日曜日の正午に、Prince ALFRED が GALATEA 号で神奈川に到着、31日に上陸して Sir Harry Parkes と昼食を共にした。(THE JAPAN OVERLAND MAIL, SATURDAY, SEPTEMBER 18TH, 1869.) この時にアスピノールが、在日英国人 250 余人を代表して接見の光栄に浴し、挨拶した記録が、英国外務省文書に Sir Henry Parks の書簡として残されている。当時におけるアスピノールの社会的な地位を示すものとみてよいであろう。ハリー・パークスの書簡のうち、アスピノールの挨拶の部分を下に示しておく。(原文は次頁の資料を参照)

また、この時、9月14日に、Admiral the Hon. Sir Henry Keppel K. C. B. のための Farewell Banquet が 80 名が出席して催された。その際、テーブルは T 字型に並べられ、その上部の席には、Mr. Marshall (the firm of Macpherson and Marshall, the president of the evening), その左に Sir Harry Parkes, Col. Norman, Captain Stanhope が、またその右にはこの日の guest である H. R. H. the Duke of Edinburgh, Sir Edmund Hornby が、またテーブルのクロスしたところには Mr. Grahame (Chairman of the Chamber of Commerce) と Mr. Aspinall (Aspinall Cornes & Co.) が座ったという。(Sep. 18 1869, THE JAPAN TIMES' OVERLAND MAIL) このことも Aspinall が当時の英国人社会で占めていた地位を自ずと示しているもののように思われる。

On arriving at the Legation His Royal Highness held a Levee which was attended by the whole of the corps Diplomatique and many other foreign officeres. A deputation of twelve of the British Community waited on His Royal Highness and presented an address which had received the Signature of upwards of two hundred and fifty British residents.

アスピノールは、1873年に引退し、それまでの Aspinall, Cornes & Co. は同年4月1日に社名を Cornes & Co. に変更した。アスピノールはその後、いったん帰英したのち、再び来日した。その間の事情は全く分かっていないが、後掲の遺言状(1866年2月22日付け)の書き出しは、William Gregson Aspinall of Yokohama Japan Merchant but at present residing in England and about to depart for Yokohama となっている。のち、1879年10月3日に横浜で没している。57歳であった。

彼の逝去に際して、THE JAPAN GAZETTE (Friday, Oct. 3, 1879) と THE JAPAN WEEKLY MAIL (Oct. 4, 1879) は、それぞれ On the 3rd instant. W. G. Aspinall Esq., aged 58 years. と記し、葬儀については、THE JAPAN GAZETTE が、The funeral will leave No. 35 at 4 p. m. tommorrow と記している。両紙の追悼文を掲げておく。

This is the last Will and Testament  
of me William Cornes, of Yokohama, Japan, Merchant but  
at present residing in England and about to depart for Yokohama  
aforesaid which I make and declare in manner following that is to say.  
In the first place I direct the payment of all my just debts funeral and  
testamentary expenses as soon as conveniently may be after my decease  
I give to my wife Caroline a clear annuity which free of English  
duty income tax or other deduction shall amount to two hundred six  
pounds per annum to be paid to her during her life by equal monthly  
payments of sixteen pounds thirteen shillings and four pence to be paid  
on the first day of each calendar month the first payment to be

thereof to be made and commence on the first day of the month  
 which shall happen next after my decease and I do give and declare  
 such annuity shall from time to time be payable into the proper  
 hands of my said wife or on her own proper receipt when and as  
 the same shall become due and that such annuity shall be for her  
 own sole use and enjoyment and without power of sale or  
 disposal or anticipation and I further declare that in the event of  
 my said wife disposing of assigning charging or attempting to or  
 anticipating such annuity or monthly payments that the same  
 shall be void and the said annuity hereby given shall nevertheless  
 call and determine I give devise and bequeath all the rest residue  
 and remainder of my estate both real and personal of what nature  
 or kind soever the same or any or any may consist wherof I may be  
 possessed or to which I may be entitled at the time of my decease  
 but charged with the payment of the said annuity unto my brother  
 Richard Aspinall of Great Tower Street in the City of London and  
 my present partner Frederick Cornes now of York Buildings (and who  
 are also hereinafter nominated as my Executors) their heirs executors  
 administrators and assigns (respectively hereinafter called my trustees  
 or trustee) upon trust that the said Richard Aspinall and Frederick  
 Cornes or the survivor of them or the heirs executors or administra-  
 tors of such survivor shall sell call in and convert into money or  
 the same or such part thereof as shall not consist of money or  
 such times and in such manner in every respect as in their  
 discretion they shall think fit and for such purpose also to or  
 compromise adjust and settle all debts due to me and from me  
 and all accounts between myself and any other person or persons  
 upon such terms and conditions as they shall think proper or  
 advisable and invest the proceeds thereof and the monies forming  
 my said trust estate in the names of my said trustee or trustee in or  
 upon any of the parliamentary stocks or public funds or government  
 securities of the United Kingdom or in or upon any of the stocks  
 funds or securities of the Government of India or upon mortgage  
 of real copyhold or leasehold (not having less than fifty years to  
 run) lands messuages and tenements in England or Wales and  
 shall and may from time to time at the discretion of my said  
 trustee or trustee vary the said investments into or for others of the  
 same or a like nature and shall stand possessed of the said residuary  
 trust estate and of the monies and the stocks funds and securities  
 in or upon which the same shall from time to time be invested in  
 trust for and to be equally divided between all and every my children  
 who being a son or sons shall attain the age of twenty one years or  
 being a daughter or daughters shall attain that age or marry in  
 equal shares as tenants in common and if there shall be only one  
 such child the whole to be in trust for that one child. But if any or  
 either of my said children shall die in my lifetime or after my decease  
 without having attained the age of twenty one years leaving lawful issue  
 who being a son or sons shall attain twenty one years or a daughter or  
 daughters shall attain that age or marry then I declare that the issue  
 of such child or children so dying in my lifetime or after my decease  
 without having attained that age shall be entitled to such share and if  
 more than one share and share alike as his heir or their parent would

have taken of and in the said residuary trust funds if such part had survived me and attained the age of twenty one years. And I declare that my trustees or trustee shall after my decease apply the whole or such part as they or he shall think fit of the income to arise from the shares to which any child shall or may for the time being be entitled in expectancy under this my will for or towards his or her maintenance and education and shall invest the remainder of the said monies and the income thereof in the names or names of my trustee or trustee in or upon any such stocks funds or securities as aforesaid or compound interest with liberty from time to time to vary the said investments into or for other of the same or a like nature and shall extend and professed of the said accumulations in trust for the person or persons who shall become entitled to the shares from which the same shall so have proceeded with liberty nevertheless for my executors or trustee from time to time to add to the accumulations of any preceding year or years and to apply the same for or towards the maintenance and education or advancement of any person for the time being presumptively entitled thereto by law or by my Executors at any time after my decease to set apart such part of my real or personal estate as they may think sufficient and to invest the same in their own names in the like securities as hereinbefore specified with reference to my said residuary trust estate for the purpose of meeting the said annuity hereinbefore given to my said wife or I empower my said executors at any time to purchase in their names a life annuity from the Government Commissioners for the reduction of the National Debt or from any public company in trust for my said wife. And I declare that after setting apart such portion of my said real and personal estate as they may think sufficient or purchasing such annuity as aforesaid that the residue of my said real and personal estate shall be discharged or from the said annuity. And I hereby declare that if the trustee hereby appointed or either of them shall die in my lifetime or if they or either of them or any future trustee or trustees shall die or desire to retire or from or refuse or become incapable to act in the trusts of this my will before the same shall be fully performed then and in every such case it shall be lawful for my continuing trustee or if there shall be no continuing trustee then for the retiring or refusing trustee or the next or next executors or administrators of the last acting trustee to appoint any other person or persons to be a trustee or trustees in the place of the trustee or trustees so dying or desiring to retire or refusing or becoming incapable to act as aforesaid and upon every such appointment as the trust premises shall be so conveyed and transferred that the same may become vested in the new trustee or trustees either jointly with the continuing trustee or trustees or solely as the case may require and every such new trustee or trustees well before as after the said trust premises shall have become vested in him) shall have all the power and authorities of the Trustee in whose place he shall be substituted. I do hereby appoint the said Richard Spinall and Frederick Cornes my sole Executors of this my will and the said Richard Spinall Guardian of my infant children. And I hereby revoke all former and other wills by me at any time heretofore made and declare the above to be my last will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand the twenty second day of February one thousand eight hundred and

sixty six — W. G. Spinnall — Signed and declared by the  
 said William Spinnall as and for his last Will and Testament  
 in the presence of us (both being present at the same time) who in his

 Affidavit filed that Testator was a British Subject —

 granted Power reserved to Frederick Carnie the other Executor

アスピノールは、tea inspector として知られていた。アスピノールが活躍した時期からみると (1873 年 [明治 6 年] に引退) かなり後の時期になるが、明治期における茶の取扱高については次のような統計が残されている。これは静岡県掛川市堀有三氏の日本茶貿易史からの引用であり、「著者 (堀有三) の父堀精助は明治八年より横浜において茶問屋を営み、明治十七年以後、各年度末にその年の商館売込み統計を作製しこれを『貿易競べ』と題して各方面に配布」したのものによる数字である。(『日本茶貿易概観』昭和十年、加藤徳三郎編纂発行、茶業組合中央会議所、126 頁以下) ひとつの参考として掲げておきたい。
